

# The Child Safeguarding Statement of the Archdiocese of Dublin

This statement has been prepared to comply with the requirements of the *Children First Act* 2015.

### 1 Statement

The Archdiocese of Dublin, as a constituent member of the Catholic Church in Ireland, recognises and upholds the dignity and rights of all children, is committed to ensuring their safety and well-being and will work in partnership with parents/ guardians to do this. The Archdiocese recognises each child as a gift from God, and values and encourages the participation of children in all activities that enhance their spiritual, physical, emotional, intellectual and social development.

All diocesan personnel (including clergy, religious, staff and volunteers) have a responsibility to safeguard children through promoting their welfare, health and development in a safe and caring environment that supports their best interests and prevents abuse.

This is the policy statement of the Catholic Church in Ireland. It is set out in *Safeguarding Children: Policy and Standards for the Catholic and Church in Ireland* (National Board for Safeguarding Children in the Catholic Church in Ireland, 2016). The document *Child Safeguarding in the Archdiocese of Dublin: Statement, Reporting Procedures and Good Practice Guidelines* describes the arrangements for the implementation of this policy in the Archdiocese of Dublin.

## 2 Nature of service and principles to safeguard children from harm

The Archdiocese of Dublin through its parishes and agencies engages with children in a variety of ways which include the following:

- Attendance by children in Church services usually, but not always, accompanied by their parents or guardians;
- Participation of children in sacramental preparation often, but not always, done in conjunction with schools;
- Participation in the sacraments through serving at Mass, singing with choirs, acting as Eucharistic Ministers and Ministers of the Word;
- Participation in youth groups and programmes;
- Participation in retreats and pilgrimages.

This list is not exhaustive.

### Safeguarding principles

The Archdiocese of Dublin endeavours to provide an environment for children (persons up to the age of 18 years) that is welcoming, nurturing and safe. The Archdiocese does this by:

- Adopting a child centred approach;
- Obtaining parental/ guardian permission for the involvement of children in Church activities;
- Choosing carefully those who work with children;
- Ensuring that diocesan workers and volunteers behave appropriately towards children;
- Encouraging positive behaviour in children and adopting strategies to prevent bullying;
- Making proper arrangements when organising activities and outings;
- Communicating appropriately with children and young people;
- Keeping good records.

### 3 Risk Assessment

The diocesan Child Safeguarding and Protection Service (CSPS) has carried out an assessment of the potential for harm to children through their involvement in Church activities in the Archdiocese. The following lists the identified risks and the practices and procedures in place for managing these risks.

- Criminal Justice (Withholding of Information on Offences against Children and Vulnerable Persons) Act 2012.
